HOPE IN ACTION

The Hope In Action Anti-Gun Violence Project implements interventions that focus on targeted, trauma-informed care designed to interrupt cycles of violence that can produce life-saving and costefficient results without contributing to the school-to-prison population and mass incarceration. This effort has identified individuals (youth and adults) at the highest risk of gun violence to coordinate individualized wrap-around resources.

The Hope In Action Anti-Gun Violence Project's intervention plan consists of four steps:

- Violence Interrupters
- Diversion and Reentry
- Wraparound
- Violence Prevention Task Force



STEP 01

VIOLENCE INTERRUPTERS

Connect individuals at high risk of gun violence to "credible messengers" and case managers who offer firsthand support. Violence Interrupters mobilize communities to present and reinforce social norms that help resolve conflicts nonviolently. Community partners facilitate mediation sessions that aid youth and young adults peacefully resolve disputes before gun violence occurs. To diffuse tensions and prevent retaliation immediate response and support are provided to victims willing to change their behaviors. Additionally, Violence Interrupters work with community partners to insert violence reduction programming into existing curricula and training.



STEP 02

DIVERSION + REENTRY

Youth outreach and engagement services are available to non-adjudicated, first-time, or reoccurring offenders. Programs include the 90-day Urban Youth Pretrial Diversion Academy and The Urban Youth Comprehensive. Diversion and reentry services for young individuals also include 3 days a week, comprehensive life coach support, that's guided by careful case planning and driven by the willing participant, working towards relationship building and community reintegration.



STEP 03

WRAPAROUND

Wraparound services are provided by the Hope Collective, a group of 23 nonprofit organizations funded by HIA which provide intensive care and basic needs services to the community in the areas of mental health, youth enrichment, and after-school programming along with career and job readiness services, and re-entry programming. These community nonprofits work to ensure that services are provided to the most vulnerable populations with the intent of reducing the crime levels in the County.



STEP 04

VIOLENCE PREVENTION TASK FORCE

A 21-person work group consisting of County government officials, police personnel, faith-based leaders, community advocates, business leaders, and community residents assemble to assess current County program offerings for youth and young adults and overall support services for those most affected by violence in the County. The Task Force engages in regular communication among partners and meets with key stakeholders to foster collective accountability. The Task Force produces an annual report that highlights national best practices that the County can implement to proactively address and reduce violent behavior.

IMPACT REPORT

Through ARPA funding, Hope In Action has received **2M** dollars, which has been used to support vulnerable communities in the following ways:

The VI program has been able to establish youth programming at Suitland High School and has developed a "Safe Passage Home" program to assist students who may experience challenges with gangs or other violent acts as a way to make it home safely after school. The Violence Interrupters are working in the community to build trust with residents and are working with residents to identify needed resources to help improve the quality of life and reduce the violence that is happening in the community.

VIOLENCE INTERRUPTERS

This impact report provides a comprehensive overview of the efforts and outcomes achieved by HIA Violence Interrupters in the Forest Creek, Suitland, and Marlow Heights communities. Violence interrupters are vital community-based organizations dedicated to preventing and mitigating violence, promoting peace, and fostering positive change in these areas. The data and insights presented in this report are based on statistics and observations gathered over the last two years.

The communities of Forest Creek, Suitland, and Marlow Heights located in Prince George's County, MD, have faced long-standing challenges related to violence, crime, and community safety. These areas have been identified by the Pince George's County Police Department as high-risk zones where violence interrupters have been actively engaged in their mission to reduce violence and promote social cohesion.

IMPACT REPORT

VIOLENCE INTERRUPTERS' ACTIVITIES & FOCUS AREAS

The violence interrupters operating in Forest Creek, Suitland, and Marlow Heights have implemented a wide range of strategies and initiatives to address violence and its root causes. The initiatives include hospital referrals. The activities have primarily focused on:

CASE MANAGEMENT AND CONFLICT RESOLUTION

HIA Violence interrupters working one on one with individuals supporting job search/interview/ placement/ support/ training, planned educational & and life goals, and worked on soft skills i.e. hygiene as well as helping them find non-violent solutions to disputes and grievances.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

They have actively engaged with community members to build trust and relationships, allowing them to better understand local issues and concerns.

YOUTH OUTREACH

Special programs have been designed to target at-risk youth, providing mentorship, education, and alternatives to violence.

RESOURCE REFERRALS

HIA Violence interrupters have connected community members with various social services, such as mental health support, housing assistance, and job training.

The Hope In Action Violence interrupters in Forest Creek, Suitland, and Marlow Heights have made substantial strides in reducing violence, mediating conflicts, and fostering positive community change. The statistics presented in this report demonstrate the tangible impact of their work. However, there is an ongoing need for continued support and investment in these critical initiatives to further enhance community safety, reduce violence, and create lasting positive change in these communities

SAFE PASSAGE

We are thrilled to introduce a newly developed project of the Hope In Action program—the "Safe Passage" initiative targeting Suitland High School. Created in close collaboration with the area's faith community, staff, and our seasoned team of Violence Interrupters, this forward-thinking initiative is designed to provide a secure and peaceful path for our students as they commute to and from school.

THE POWER OF PARTNERSHIP

The Safe Passage Initiative is a shining example of what can be achieved when a community comes together for a common cause. Alongside our dedicated staff, we have forged vital partnerships with local faith organizations. These collaborative efforts are further strengthened by our Violence Interrupters, who bring specialized skills and intimate knowledge of the community to preemptively address potentially violent situations.

OUR EVIDENCE-BASED APPROACH

Safe Passage integrates a multi-faceted, data-driven strategy that includes:

ACTIVE MONITORING

Our staff and Violence Interrupters are deployed along identified hotspots and high-risk routes, offering a visible presence that deters violent activity.

COMMUNITY AND STUDENT EDUCATION

We regularly offer workshops, informational sessions, and awareness-raising activities to equip students, parents, and community members with the tools they need to contribute to a safer environment.

CONTINUOUS EVALUATION

By keeping a close eye on incident data and community feedback, we fine-tune our strategies in real-time to ensure maximum effectiveness.

The Safe Passage initiative is not a one-off effort; it is an ongoing commitment to the safety and well-being of our young people. We look forward to scaling and adapting the program based on evolving needs and evidence. The Safe Passage initiative is not just about deterring violence—it's about laying the groundwork for a safer, more secure future for our children.



HOPE COLLECTIVE

A key component of The Hope In Action Project is the Hope Collective, a group of non-profits that have received funding to provide community and school-based wraparound services in areas where violent crime is an issue. Programming includes services such as diversion and re-entry, youth mentoring, after-school enrichment programs, and employment assistance. The Violence Prevention Task Force works in tandem to identify areas of need in the County and create a plan to aid in resource sharing between non-profits and stakeholders, while also developing short and long-term strategies to prevent violence.





PREVENTION TASK FORCE

Gun violence remains a pressing issue in Prince George's County. These recommendations aim to provide a framework for addressing the complexities of this issue through evidence-based solutions. It is crucial to note that there is no one-size-fits-all approach to reducing gun violence, and collaboration between stakeholders is vital for the successful implementation of these strategies. By taking decisive steps now, we can protect our community and secure a safer, more prosperous future for all residents.

RECOMMENDATIONS

ADDRESS SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC INEQUALITY

- Advocate for state and federal support in addressing social determinants that contribute to gun violence.
- Invest in social programs aimed at poverty reduction, job creation, and education in neighborhoods with high rates of gun violence.

IMPROVE MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

- Allocate funding for mental health programs targeting at-risk populations.
- Establish a screening mechanism within schools to identify early signs of emotional distress and potential for violence.

STRENGTHEN COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

- Form collaborations between government agencies, schools, community organizations, and law enforcement to exchange information, insights, and strategies.
- Collaborate with local universities and colleges to establish research centers dedicated to studying the causes and consequences of gun violence in our region.

BUILD COMMUNITY AND SCHOOL-Based programs

- Collaborate with schools to establish trauma-informed support services for students who have witnessed or been affected by gun violence.
- Establish and strengthen after-school programs that offer recreational and educational opportunities as alternatives to violent behavior.

SUPPORT VICTIMS AND THEIR FAMILIES

- Establish specialized trauma-informed victim support services for those affected by gun violence, including survivors and their families.
- Create a fund to provide financial assistance to victims and their families for medical expenses, funeral costs, and other related financial burdens.

INVEST IN EVIDENCE-BASED INTERVENTIONS

- Support evidence-based interventions and focused deterrence strategies.
- Create a central repository of research findings and best practices to facilitate knowledge sharing among stakeholders.
- Collaborate with national and international organizations to exchange insights on successful evidence-based programs.

DEVELOP A FUNDING STRATEGY

- Pursue sources of possible funding opportunities through grants, federal programs, public-private partnerships, and corporate sponsorship.
- Engage local policymakers and show the benefits of gun violence prevention and advocate for a portion of the county budget to be allocated to such programs, using data and case studies to support the request.

INCREASE PUBLIC EDUCATION AND AWARENESS

- Develop a youth-informed and led public information campaign focused on the causes and consequences of gun violence.
- Use social media, community events, and schools as platforms for spreading awareness.
